A Family Affair

Like a lot of sisters, Sandy Szopinski and Ellen Cook look forward to spending time together. In fact, they have a standing lunch date every Tuesday at St. Ann Center, and their mutual BFF (best furry friend) joins them.

Sandy, a client at the Stein Campus for the past four years, breezes from one activity to another in her power wheelchair. "She's involved in so many great programs at St. Ann Center," Ellen, a professional photographer, said. "I wanted to find a way my dog, Sofie, and I could help out here." Ellen registered her charismatic Bearded Collie as a St. Ann Center pet volunteer, and Sofie instantly became a shaggy celebrity.

In exchange for treats, she will speak, give high fives and snuggle. "One young client in a wheelchair was having a difficult day, so I lifted Sofie up so he could pet her," Ellen recalled. "He immediately relaxed."

Sandy is happy that her family has become such a fun part of her life at St. Ann Center. Although having cerebral palsy can make things difficult, she said, "I feel at home here." Living in a senior apartment complex just blocks from the Stein Campus, Sandy takes a van to the center five days a week. "I look forward to the whirlpool baths and massages," she said. She gets haircuts and manicures at the center's beauty salon and enjoys making jewelry and ceramic pieces.

> Recently, Sandy had her first appointment at the Gardetto Family Community Dental Clinic at St. Ann Center's Bucyrus Campus. "The staff was nice and very respectful," she said. Ellen added. "There are few options for someone with CP and other disabilities to receive dental care."

> > St. Ann Center allows Sandy to live independently with dignity as she ages, Ellen said. "It's a

place where she is well cared forwhere she can socialize and do things she enjoys with people she likes.

Tiffany Payne still laughs when she thinks of the day Advocate when she thinks of the day her younger cousin brought a friend home to play. After they

were introduced, she overheard the visitor ask, "What's wrong with her?" Her cousin responded, "Nothing. She has cerebral palsy. The switch in her brain that tells her body to walk doesn't work. But everything else works really good!"

That's obvious in her accomplishments as a social worker and intake coordinator for the Bucyrus Campus. Tiffany meets with prospective clients for adult day care, gives tours to families and helps clients attain their goals. But one of her most important roles is not listed on her job description. "Working with a population that's considered vulnerable, we must be their advocates," she said.

Tiffany stresses the impact of words. The words "disabled person" or "wheelchair bound" emphasize the disability, she explained, whereas "a person with a disability" and "people who use wheelchairs" put the person first.

Tiffany is working to build a world of inclusion, starting with intergenerational programs like St. Ann Center's. "When we expose children to people of various ages and abilities, they're able to think outside their own experiences," she said. "They learn to appreciate differences, not fear them."

A Ministry of Caring



2018 has been a milestone year for Sr. Marianne Muscott, OSF. Besides celebrating her 60th year as a Sister, she retired in July after 15 years of working at St. Ann Center as a pastoral psychotherapist.

Pastoral psychotherapy is like cognitive therapy, only with a spiritual dimension. "I invite my clients to ask God to be a part of our work," Sr. Marianne explained. Over the years, she's counseled adults, children, couples and families, dealing with addiction, grieving, marriage, depression, growing up and aging. She's worked with clients across Milwaukee and at both the Stein and Bucyrus Campuses.

"There's an environment of faith, hope and love at St. Ann Center more powerful than any one religion," Sr. Marianne said. As she looks forward to retirement, "I'm grateful for my flexibility, and I'm open to new opportunities."

Urban Kids Flourish on Farm

City kids in St. Ann Center's summer camp program have found farm life to be fertile ground for fun and learning.

Dozens of youngsters from the Bucyrus and Stein Campuses paid weekly visits to Creating Pathways Farm in Sussex. "Our goal is to immerse the children in nature," said the farm's owner, Rose Koremenos.

On their lush 20 acres, Rose and her husband, Gus, have created a living classroom. Campers tramped through the woods, stopping to identify trees or listen to the song the creek sings. With help from farm volunteers and staff, they learned how to read a compass and name the different kinds of fish swimming in the crystalclear farm pond.

The kids got a healthy dose of horse sense, too. With each visit, they found out more about Rose's friendly herd. One young cowboy asked Rose if he could be her overnight barn guest. "He even picked out the hay bale where he planned on sleeping," she said.

"We are fortunate to be stewards of this land," Rose added. "It's a blessing to be able to share it with the children and watch the little buds of curiosity open."

Fired Up to Learn

Where's the pole? That was the burning question St. Ann Center's 4- and 5-year-olds had during a visit to the St. Francis Fire Department. Their tour guide, Lt. Mike Corso, explained that a pole isn't necessary at their single-story building. But he happily showed them dozens of other cool things that make a firehouse such a fascinating place.

The kids took an up-close look at an ambulance, sat behind the wheel of a fire truck and ate lunch at the firehouse. Fire safety tips were sprinkled throughout the visit. "We like to show the kids what we look like in and out of our gear," Lt. Mike said. "The more exposure kids have to firemen and what they look like, the less likely they will be fearful should they ever have to meet one of us in their home during a rescue."

"When we put Matt in and he hits his shot, everybody goes nuts, including the

guys on the other team," said Carlos Mireles, coach of the Milwaukee Bucks Wheelchair Basketball Club's Division III men's team, which Matt captains. A client in our Stein Campus' young adult unit, Matt plays guard for his team, which is part of the Wisconsin Adaptive Sports Association.

Born with cerebral palsy, Matt was introduced to the sport when he was in kindergarten. "My mom and dad took me to see a game," he said. He started playing in fourth grade and joined a competitive team in high school. Now at age 33, he's just hitting his stride, competing with teams from across the Midwest and as far away as Colorado.

Sports wheelchairs are lightweight and streamlined to allow for speed and agility. "My chair is kind of special," Matt added with a smile. **"It has wheels that glow in the dark."**
