Remember moving out on your own for the first time?

### Your support gives St. Ann Center clients that same exciting feeling of independence. Just ask Sarah Lapre.

"Some days, I hardly think about having cerebral palsy," said the self-assured 33-year-old. Born with CP, she's used a wheelchair for most of her life.

"I just tell myself I'm not letting anything that's going on with my body get me down. I won't let anything beat me."

That hasn't always been easy. For a time, before coming to St. Ann Center, Sarah did piecework in a vocational training program. It was physically taxing. "Around that time, my sister brought my niece and nephew to St. Ann Center for

swimming lessons," she said. "As soon as she saw the place, she called to tell me, 'Sarah, you have to come here!'"

In the three years that she's been a client at the Stein Campus, Sarah has participated in the center's swimming, ceramics, jewelry-making and art programs and

used massage services, as well. But one of the things she values most about her time at St. Ann Center is the confidence it's given her.

"Here, people let me do what I need to do, handle what I can handle, and trust that if I



need help, I'll ask," she said. "That freedom has shown me how to be more independent." Sarah demonstrated just how capable she is a year ago, when she moved into her own apartment. "That was a huge step for me and my family,"

she added.

The godmother of her young niece and nephew, Sarah enjoys the intergenerational environment at St. Ann Center. "When the kids ask about my chair, I just explain that, for me, the wheelchair is like my legs," Sarah said. "There's no need to be shy around me."

Not one to shy away from

anything, Sarah recently went zip-lining while on vacation and loved it. "I'll try anything once," she said, revealing her next extreme sport dream, "I really want to try bungee jumping."

Dear Friend

The other day, Sue, one of our adult clients, told me about a unique perk of coming to St. Ann Center. "It's made me 'the cool grandma," she said. Thanks to our intergenerational music therapy sessions, she knows every word of "Baby Shark" and "The Wheels on the Bus." Her grandkids are thrilled that she can sing their favorite songs along with them.

Our combined music classes for adults and children are always popular. The fun songs and the youngsters' liveliness brighten up everybody's day. Making music together connects people in ways that few other activities can. It truly bonds the generations.

Recently, I dropped by our four-year-olds' classroom. Their teacher told me they'd been working on a song and were ready to sing it for me. I was half-expecting a pop or rap song. Imagine my surprise when they took a deep breath and sang, "You are my sunshine...my only sunshine!" That 1939 hit was one my own parents taught me when I was four.

Our music therapist, Hannah Goodness, let me borrow a picture book she's been using in her intergenerational classes. It's based on one of the greatest songs of all time.



"What a Wonderful World," as sung by

Louis Armstrong. As I read it, I couldn't help but notice how beautifully it reflects life at St. Ann Center–a place where we reverence "skies of blue and clouds of white," where the colors in the rainbow "are also on the faces of people going by" and where babies will grow up to "learn much more than I'll ever know."

As the year draws to a close, I thank all St. Ann Center supporters and friends for creating a truly wonderful world, where kids grow up and adults grow older in the best way possible– together.

Entitled **Seasons 414**, Tyler's piece is part of the Milwaukee County Transit System's Bus Shelter Art Project. His colorful illustration depicts a diverse group of people enjoying Wisconsin's winter, spring, summer and fall months. Only a couple blocks from St. Ann Center's Bucyrus Campus, this is the first shelter located on Milwaukee's north side to be part of the project.

"I definitely was inspired by working at St. Ann Center," Tyler said. "It's an amazing thing to see how people of different ages and ethnicities come together here." His seasonal scenes feature men, women and children of all ages and include a man in a wheelchair "checking his cell phone and just chillin'," Tyler added.

Part of what motivated him to participate in the bus art project was his love for Milwaukee. "I wanted to contribute something to the city that adopted me," the Brooklyn native explained.

### To Africa with Love

Fourth graders at Bay View's St. Thomas Aquinas Academy recently took on a special fundraising project. Not for a class trip or party, it was to help other children more than 6,000 miles away through St. Ann Center's Cameroon Goat & Chicken Fund.

"I grew up in the Dominican Republic, and we had Aloe vera plants growing in our backyard," Rita recalled. "We used the gel inside its leaves as a healing ointment." Those memories inspired the name of her business, Aloekui, and her line of homemade Aloe-packed products.

Up until a few months ago, Rita sold her soaps primarily online and at Milwaukee's Cathedral Square Market. That's where she met Sr. Edna. "She's sold her jewelry right beside me for years," Rita said. "Last summer, she told me there was a place at the Bucyrus Campus that would be perfect for me to set up shop. I took a tour, and I was immediately hooked.

"The best part is that I'm from the community," she added. "I live five minutes away." Rita spends hours making soaps, bath bombs, shower gels, shampoo bars, salt scrubs and more in the basement of her home. She also makes time to participate in St. Ann Center's First Fridays 4Business, a fast-growing networking group of north side entrepreneurs that meets monthly at the Bucyrus Campus.

"It's important for our clients to be able to go outside and take in the beauty around them," Mary said. The childcare classes benefit, too. "I brought in a monarch caterpillar the other day," she added. "We're going to teach the kids how to grow milkweed."

Mary and Ken are always happy to share their garden smarts when clients and staff ask for growing tips. They're also quick to pass along seeds, slips and extra plants– many of which are donated. Mary's neighbors donated daisies and irises. A client's caregiver contributed a garden statue and birdbath. The Sisters of St. Francis of Assisi pitched in, too. "This year, they gave us 30 geranium plants they raised in their hoop house," Mary said.

This time of year, Ken is hauling pots full of annuals inside. They'll spend the winter in the center's sunny atrium. But he's much more than a fair-weather volunteer. "A lot of damage is done to walls by wheelchairs," he said. "So when it's cold out, I do touchup painting inside until it's gardening season again."

Many of our clients don't have the space for a home garden or the physical ability to maintain one. Thanks to you, our donors, they enjoy the life-giving beauty of flowers at St. Ann Center every day.
